






The Arkansas Peer Advisory Committee (APAC)

- 15 community stakeholders as members.
- Certified PRSs with extensive knowledge and experience regarding roles of peer specialists and the work they do.
- APAC's primary responsibility is to advise the DHS Recovery Unit on best peer recovery practices.
- Offer guidance to strengthen the peer recovery workforce across the state.



III. Arkansas Peer Recovery Regions

Arkansas has five (5) recovery regions, shown in the map below.



Region numbers and names of counties included in each peer recovery region are shown in the table below:

Region	Included Counties (Total Number & Names)
Region 1	16 Counties (Benton, Carroll, Boone, Marion, Washington, Madison, Newton, Searcy, Crawford, Franklin, Johnson, Pope, Van Buren, Logan, Scott, Sebastian)
Region 2	19 Counties (Baxter, Fulton, Randolph, Clay, Izard, Sharp, Lawrence, Greene, Stone, Independence, Jackson, Craighead, Mississippi, Cleburne, White, Woodruff, Poinsett, Cross, Crittenden)
Region 3	10 Counties (Pulaski, Saline, Yell, Hot Spring, Grant, Jefferson, Lonoke, Conway, Perry, Faulkner)
Region 4	17 Counties (Union, Columbia, Miller, Sevier, Lafayette, Calhoun, Ouachita, Nevada, Hempstead, Little River, Dallas, Clark, Pike, Howard, Polk, Montgomery, Garland)
Region 5	13 Counties (St. Francis, Lee, Monroe, Prairie, Arkansas, Phillips, Cleveland, Lincoln, Desha, Drew, Bradley, Ashley, Chicot)

- Formed in 2019 as an Arkansas recovery coalition.
- Before Covid APART had 60 members, they are now down to 10 members but are looking to expand again.
- 5 Work Groups
 - Education
 - Recovery Services
 - Outreach
 - Communication & Marketing
 - Youth
- These 5 work groups began assessing the needs of Hot Springs County

- In 2021 a partnership was developed with ABHIN
- This partnership helped target vulnerable populations and the gaps in barriers for people with SUD.
- APART was able to expand to serve 10 counties:

Cleburne	 Newton
Marrion	• Searcy
• Sevier	• Stone
• Van Buren	 Madison

• APART signed a contract with ABHIN, leading them to develop an

Outreach Specialist position.

- The Outreach Specialist was developed to work with people in the community with Substance Use Disorder.
- They were able to work with local food pantries to share information.
- They will also soon be implementing Naloxone Drop Boxes

APART also partnered with CRDC in order to implement the Stop the Stigma Campaign that will be establishing billboards in 28 counties





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
